


















MAT ISHBIA

CONTROLLING OWNER & GOVERNOR



About:

Mat Ishbia is an American entrepreneur, NBA team owner, author and philanthropist. He is best known for being the president and CEO of United Wholesale Mortgage, the #1 overall mortgage lender in America.

In December 2023, Ishbia agreed to purchase the Phoenix Suns and Phoenix Mercury. In February 2023, the NBA's Board of Governors unanimously approved the transfer of ownership.

Born and raised in suburban Detroit, Ishbia attended Michigan State University from 1998 until 2002 where he played as a point guard on the Michigan State Men's Basketball Team. During that time his team won three Big Ten championships, made three NCAA Final Four appearances, and won the NCAA national championship in 2000. After playing basketball at Michigan State University for four years, Ishbia served one year as a student assistant coach on Coach Izzo's staff.

Business Career:

After Ishbia served as a student assistant coach, he joined United Wholesale Mortgage

(UWM), as its 12th employee. He started out in operations of the business and learned the mortgage process from the ground up holding various positions within the company from account executive to loan originator and everything in between. Since taking the helm as CEO 2013, Ishbia has grown the company to about 7,000 team members, gone public in the largest SPAC of its time and gained notoriety as the industry advocate for independent mortgage brokers. This advocacy inspired him to develop state-of-the-art technology, training and elite service for brokers, which levels the playing field between brokers and retail loan officers. Mat also uses his and UWM's public platform to educate consumers on the benefits of working with an independent mortgage broker as the fastest, easiest and cheapest way to get a mortgage. Mat leads by example valuing positive attitudes, great work ethics and prioritizing people. At the height of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, Ishbia also promised he would sleep on someone's couch before he laid off a single team member. To this day, UWM has not had a single layoff in its 36-year company history.

Philanthropy:

Ishbia is passionate about philanthropy and focuses on creating opportunity for kids and his local community. In 2018, when Ishbia's company moved to Pontiac, MI, UWM was eligible for \$1.9 million in tax breaks for its new headquarters. Ishbia made the decision to return the money to the Oakland County Brownfield Redevelopment Authority. In 2020, Mat Ishbia donated \$32 million to Michigan State University athletics, the largest single cash commitment in MSU's history from an individual. In addition, Mat, through UWM, offered every single Michigan State University football, basketball (men's and women's), and women's volley player the opportunity to sign and NIL deal.

Closing out 2020, Ishbia also donated \$1 million to the V Foundation to support Dick Vitale's efforts to raise awareness for pediatric cancer research.

In 2021, Ishbia purchased Ultimate Soccer, in Pontiac, MI, and committed \$10 million to enhance it to provide a space free of charge for local youth sports and recreation, while renaming it the UWM Sports Complex. The state of the art facility now holds 8 full basketball courts, 16 volleyball courts, two soccer fields and an indoor track. His goal is to ensure those who may be facing cost and transportation barriers are able to access the facility.

The same year, Mat donated \$500K to help fund The Flint Sports Complex at Sylvester Broome Empowerment Village to enable kids in Flint. Michigan to develop leadership skills through sports and teamwork.

Recently, Ishbia donated another \$1 million to the V foundation in 2022 which was matched by his brother, Justin to continue supporting the organization's efforts in pediatric cancer research. He also made a generous donation to Beaumont to support a renovation of the hospital's Cardiovascular Intensive Care Unit.

JUSTIN ISHBIA ALTERNATE GOVERNOR



Justin Ishbia is the CEO and Founder of one of the nation's best-performing private equity firms, Shore Capital Partners ("Shore"). Since the firm's inception in 2009, Justin has grown Shore from 4 to 120 team members managing over \$6 billion in Regulatory Assets Under Management across more than 50 platforms representing 800+ acquired companies.

Shore has helped "microcap" companies grow bigger, stronger and faster through thoughtful investments in people, processes and systems. Shore's portfolio companies now span over 1,500 locations representing more than 30,000 employees.

As of the end of 2022, Shore has been recognized each of the last 3 years as one of Inc. Magazine's Top Founder-Friendly Private Equity Firms. Shore is also the most active private equity firm in the world by deal volume, according to PitchBook.

SAM GARVIN

ALTERNATE GOVERNOR



Sam Garvin, who launched his own mail-in rebate and consumer promotions company at age 25, is in his 19th season with the Suns after purchasing interest in the club in June 2004.

The self-made entrepreneur founded Scottsdale-based Continental Promotion Group in 1989 and its business grew to over \$1 billion in annual gross revenues and attracted

An acknowledged philanthropic leader he has served on many over 500 blue-chip marketers worldwide. As chairman and chief executive officer from 1989-2005, he managed over non-profit Boards including: Thunderbird (AGSIM), PCDS 1,200 associates, and organized and executed consumer and (Phoenix Country Day School) Max in Motion, Whispering Hope trade promotions for Dell, Nestle, Henkel, Costco, BT (British Ranch, Phoenix Suns Charities and many others. Telecom), HP, Motorola, Disney and Eli Lilly on a global scale. Garvin's for-profit Board service includes Engaged Media. Direct Brands, Innovative Brands, Expert Negotiator, Garvin, who sold CPG in June 2005, took on additional Intelladerm LLC and many others. He is the founder of responsibilities with the Suns shortly thereafter. A Suns fan Garvin Promotion Group, an international strategic promotion since 1989, Garvin purchased single-game tickets in the upper marketing firm headquartered in Scottsdale with operation in Canada and the European Union. GPG's current clients include bowl when the team played at Veterans Memorial Coliseum and has attended Suns games for the last 25 years. In July 2007, Pirelli, Sumitomo USA, Henkel USA, Seagram's and over he was appointed an alternate NBA Governor to represent the 100 others. Garvin is active in real estate and private equity organization. investing through Garvin Holdings, LLC. He is also an owner of Real Mallorca, a Spanish football club.

Prior to CPG. Garvin served in the Ronald Reagan administration as a staff assistant on the Presidential Commission for the German-American Tri-Centennial. He then went to work for Heinz U.S.A. as a sales merchandiser where he learned the marketing of packaged goods from the ground up. In 1988, he graduated from Thunderbird, one of the top

business schools in the country, with a masters of international management specializing in marketing. In 2003, he was awarded a doctor of international law degree, honoris causa, from Thunderbird

In 1998, Garvin was recognized by the Phoenix Business Journal as one of Arizona's "Top 40 under 40" most influential business leaders. In 1999, he was recognized by then Arizona Governor Jane Hull with the "Governor's Spirit of Success" award. He was twice nominated for Ernst and Young's "Entrepreneur of the Year" award.

Born and raised in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Garvin completed his Bachelor of Arts degree with a dual major in political science and German studies at the University of Pittsburgh in three years. He resides in Paradise Valley with his wife, Rita, and three children.

JAMES JONES

PRESIDENT, BASKETBALL OPERATIONS AND GENERAL MANAGER



Winner of the 2020-21 NBA Basketball Executive of the Year Award, James Jones oversees all basketball operations for the Phoenix Suns in his role as president of basketball operations and general manager. His peers recognized him with the award in 2021 as he architected a Suns team that won the franchise's first Western Conference title since 1993, then followed that with

a franchise record 64 wins in the 2021-22 season. Jones is in his fourth season as general manager and was promoted to president of basketball operations on November 28, 2022.

After being named general manager following the 2018-19 season, Jones oversaw a rise in which the Suns become just the third team since the NBA-ABA merger to jump from a bottom two record to one of the league's top two records in two seasons or less, completing the ascension with Western Conference and Pacific Division titles in 2020-21. The Suns jumped from 19 wins to 34 in Jones' first full season as general manager, then to 51 wins in his second season and 64 wins in his third season, becoming the first team in NBA history to have at least a 13game win increase in three consecutive seasons. The 64 wins in 2021-22 marked the league's best record by eight games, the NBA's largest differential in 22 years, and included a franchise record 18-game winning streak as the Suns won their second straight division title.

Officially named general manager on April 11, 2019, Jones is in his fourth season as general manager and sixth season overall working in the Suns' front office. He was originally hired as vice president of basketball operations before the 2017-18 season then handled general manager duties on an interim basis for the 2018-19 season.

Jones has led the evaluation and evolution of team operations since becoming general manager, helping to build a stronger connection between the front office, players and team personnel. In one of his initial moves in 2019, he oversaw the Suns' hire of highly-respected head coach Monty Williams, and Jones has since overseen a series of transactions that has yielded a deep, complementary roster striving to instill a championship culture.

A three-time NBA Champion and 14-year NBA veteran as a player, Jones was a consistent winner and one of the league's most respected players by his teammates and peers, serving several years as Secretary-Treasurer for the National Basketball Players Association prior to joining the Suns' front office.

Two of Jones' 14 NBA seasons were spent with the Suns and they were two of the most successful in franchise history as he was a member of the 2005-06 team that won 54 games and advanced to the Western Conference Finals, as well as the 2006-07 team that won 61 games and advanced to the Western Conference Semifinals. He contributed to two Pacific Division titles in his two seasons in Phoenix, averaging 7.8 points and 2.8 rebounds in 151 regular-season games with the team while shooting 38.2 percent from behind the arc.

In each of his final seven seasons as a player, Jones reached the NBA Finals to join his teammate for all seven LeBron James and six Boston Celtics Hall of Famers from the 1950s and 1960s as the only players in NBA history to do so in at least seven consecutive seasons. Nicknamed "Champ," he captured three NBA titles, winning rings with the Miami Heat in 2012 and 2013, and with the Cleveland Cavaliers in 2016.

Overall, the 2011 Three-Point Shootout winner at NBA All-Star averaged 5.2 points and 1.8 rebounds in 15.7 minutes while shooting 40.1 percent from three-point range in 709 career regular-season games over 14 seasons with five NBA teams. Jones never played for a team that finished below .500 and only once missed the playoffs as he appeared in 148 career playoff games. In addition to his two seasons with the Suns, Jones played two seasons with the Indiana Pacers (2003-2005), one season with the Portland Trail Blazers (2007-08), six seasons with the Heat (2008-2014) and three seasons with the Cavaliers (2014-2017).

A native of Miami, Jones is a member of the University of Miami Sports Hall of Fame as he starred collegiately for the Hurricanes and graduated with a degree in finance before being selected by the Pacers with the 49th overall pick in the 2003 NBA Draft.

In 2009, Jones and his wife, Destiny, founded the James Jones Legacy Foundation with a mission to make a difference in the lives of children who do not have access to positive role models. He and Destiny have one son, James Dylan ("J.D."), and two daughters, Jadynn and Jodie.

MORGAN CATO

VICE PRESIDENT, BASKETBALL OPERATIONS AND ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER



Morgan Cato enters her first season with the Phoenix Suns as assistant general manager and vice president of basketball operations where she reports to president of basketball operations and general manager James Jones and works with head coach Monty Williams to lead the team's strategy and business processes for basketball growth and performance with a focus on coaching development, player engagement and front office personnel operations. Cato is the first woman of color to hold the assistant general manager title for an NBA team.

Prior to joining the Suns, Cato spent the last decade with the NBA league office, most recently as Associate Vice President of Business Operations for NBA League Operations. Working directly with Byron Spruell, the President of League Operations, she was a key member of the management team focused on strategic basketball initiatives for the growth of the game. This included coaching and officiating development, basketball talent pipeline and related programs, the launch of the Basketball Africa League, advocacy for women and people of color in basketball operations and actively liaised with NBA teams on overall operational and engagement needs. Her previous experiences focused on professional talent development in the consulting, investment banking and non-profit industries.

A graduate of Stony Brook University, and Harvard Business School's Executive track, Cato is a native of Brooklyn, New York.

TREVOR BUKSTEIN

ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER



Trevor Bukstein is in his tenth season as assistant general manager, a role in which he combines his knowledge in the interpretation and application of the league's Collective Bargaining Agreement, salary cap management and trade and contract negotiations with his scouting proficiency as a talent evaluator.

During the 2018-19 season, Bukstein handled general manager duties on an interim basis alongside the club's current General Manager James Jones.

Prior to becoming assistant general manager, Bukstein spent the previous three seasons as the Suns' director of basketball administration. Bukstein joined the Suns after six years as an athlete representation specialist at Williams and Connolly, LLP, where he assisted the sports law practice with its NBA, WNBA and MLB clients.

A Madison, Wisconsin native, Bukstein earned his law degree from the Georgetown University Law Center following his undergraduate work at the University of Michigan. Bukstein has three brothers, including a twin who is a professor at the University of Central Florida

RYAN RESCH

VICE PRESIDENT. BASKETBALL STRATEGY AND EVALUATION



Ryan Resch enters his seventh season with the Phoenix Suns, and his second as vice president of basketball strategy and evaluation, a role in which he manages the team's roster building strategy, basketball analytics, and personnel evaluation while working alongside president of basketball operations and general manager James Jones to coordinate basketball operations initiatives throughout the organization.

During the Suns' run to the NBA Finals in the 2020-21 season, Resch served as chief of staff/director of basketball strategy, playing a role in assembling the team's Western Conference title winning roster. In addition to serving as director of basketball strategy for the 2019-20 season, he has also held titles of basketball strategy analyst and basketball operations analyst since first joining the Suns as a basketball analytics intern.

Prior to joining the Suns, Resch worked for the men's basketball program at Baylor University, serving as graduate assistant from 2015-2017 after previously having worked as the Bears' head manager. Resch earned both a master's degree in sport management and a bachelor's degree in political science and government from Baylor.





MONTY WILLIAMS

HEAD COACH

Monty Williams is in his third season as Phoenix Suns head coach following a Western Conference title and trip to the NBA Finals as his peers recognized him with the Michael H. Goldberg NBCA Coach of the Year Award for his accomplishments in the 2020-21 season.

An experienced NBA coach highly-respected throughout the league for his coaching pedigree, leadership and commitment to the community, Williams initially agreed to terms with the Suns to become the team's new head coach on May 3, 2019 as the team won 19 games in the season before his arrival. Just over two years later, on June 30, 2021, the Suns clinched a berth in the NBA Finals by winning the Western Conference.

Williams, 50, has led the team to consecutive increases of at least 15 wins despite fewer games being played in each season, improving by 15 wins in 2019-20 and 17 wins in 2020-21. By accomplishing this, the Suns became just the fifth team in NBA history to increase its win total by 15-plus games in successive seasons. Over the last 45 years, the Suns became just the third team to improve from a bottom two record to a top two record in two seasons or less.

In 2020-21, Williams led the Suns to the NBA's second-best record and the team's first Pacific Division title since 2007. This preceded a memorable playoff run in which the Suns won a franchise postseason record nine straight games on the way to the third Western Conference title in team history, and first since 1993. The Suns posted the league's best road record and best record over the season's final 56 games (43-13) while becoming the first Suns team since 1997-98 to rank in the top 10 in both Offensive and Defensive Rating.



Williams was recognized as the Western Conference Coach of the Month for March 2021, his second time winning the honor, and was runner-up in voting for 2020-21 NBA Coach of the Year in addition to winning the award given by his peers in the NBCA.

In his first season as Suns head coach in 2019-20, he helped transform the team's culture and oversaw a 15-win improvement, named the NBA Head Coach of the Seeding Games after guiding the Suns to an 8-0 record in the NBA Restart after the season was suspended in March.

Williams spent his first five seasons as a head coach with the New Orleans Hornets/Pelicans from 2010-2015, leading the team to two postseason appearances. In his first season, the Hornets won 46 games and Williams was the Western Conference Coach of the Month for January 2011 as he led New Orleans' return to the playoffs after missing them the season before his arrival. Following the departure of All-NBA guard Chris Paul prior to the 2011-12 season, Williams oversaw the growth and development of one of the league's youngest rosters, increasing the team's win total in three straight seasons culminating in 45 wins in 2014-15 to lead New Orleans back to the playoffs.

In addition to his seven seasons as an NBA head coach, Williams has totaled seven seasons as an assistant coach, two seasons in a front office role, one season as a coaching intern and nine seasons as a player, giving him 26 years of NBA experience since first being drafted in 1994. He completed his first season as an assistant coach with the Philadelphia 76ers in 2018-19, helping the team to a 51-31 record and a berth in the Eastern Conference Semifinals. Williams served as associate head coach for the Oklahoma City Thunder in 2015-16, contributing to the Thunder's trip to the Western Conference Finals, and spent five seasons as an assistant coach with the Portland Trail Blazers from 2005-2010, a stint that included two playoff appearances. He got his start in coaching as a coaching intern with the San Antonio Spurs for the 2004-05 season when the team won an NBA Championship. Before returning to the bench in 2018, Williams spent two seasons in the Spurs' front office as vice president of basketball operations from 2016-2018.

Williams also served as one of three assistant coaches for the USA Basketball Men's National Team from 2013-2016. As a member of Mike Krzyzewski's staff, Williams assisted the USA to a perfect overall record of 26-0, including gold-medal finishes at the 2014 FIBA World Cup in Spain and the 2016 Olympic Games in Brazil.

Williams was a nine-year NBA veteran as a player, averaging 6.3 points in 456 career games with New York, San Antonio,

Denver, Orlando and Philadelphia. His best season came with the Spurs in 1996-97 when he averaged a career-high 9.0 points plus 3.2 rebounds and 1.4 assists. Of the seven head coaches he appeared in a game under throughout his NBA career, six won the NBA Coach of the Year Award at least once at some point in their careers (Pat Riley, Don Nelson, Gregg Popovich, Mike D'Antoni, Doc Rivers, Larry Brown) and three have been enshrined in the Basketball Hall of Fame (Riley, Nelson, Brown).

The 24th overall pick in the first round of the 1994 NBA Draft by the Knicks, Williams' NBA career began after he earned honorable mention All-America honors at the University of Notre Dame for his senior season in 1993-94 when he averaged 22.4 points and 8.4 rebounds. Williams began his career in South Bend playing for Digger Phelps and played his final two seasons for John MacLeod, a member of the Suns Ring of Honor and the winningest coach in Suns history. Born in Fredericksburg, Virginia, Williams starred at Potomac High School in Oxon Hill, Maryland before heading to Notre Dame where he earned a degree in the school's College of Arts and Letters, majoring in communications and theatre.

Recognized as a revered friend and role model to many in the basketball community and beyond, at the 2017 NBA Awards, Williams was the recipient of the inaugural Sager Strong Award, an honor named for iconic Turner Sports sideline reporter Craig Sager presented annually to an individual who has been a trailblazer while exemplifying courage, faith, compassion and grace.


THEY'RE BACK: PHOENIX SUNS REVIVES CLASSIC UNIFORM INSPIRED BY 1992-1993 WESTERN CONFERENCE CHAMPION TEAM

They're back!

In 1993, eleven-time All-Star and '93 Most Valuable Player Charles Barkley led the Suns to the NBA Finals, earning the franchise and the city of Phoenix global recognition. In celebration of the 30th anniversary of this historic team, the Suns' classic rising sunburst uniform returned for the 2022-23 season. The streaking sun across the chest of the jersey is one of the most popular looks in franchise history and this year's Nike Hardwood Classic Edition uniform is a modern version of the cult classic.

"This is one of the most iconic uniforms in all of sports. They mark an era of fantastic success for the franchise during a time of significant growth for the NBA as a whole," said Chris Grasha, creative director, Phoenix Suns. "Fans have been looking to see these return to the court for a long time and the 30th anniversary of that historic season is the perfect time to bring them back."






The vibrant sunburst look was the first major redesign of the team's uniforms in more than 20 years. The uniform debuted on November 7, 1992, Barkley's first game as a Phoenix Sun and the first regular season game to be played at the new downtown Phoenix arena (then named America West Arena, now Footprint Center). The iconic team included Suns standouts Kevin Johnson, Dan Majerle, Mark West, Cedric Ceballos, and Tom Chambers.

Suns Ring of Honor member Paul Westphal coached the team to a record 62 regular season wins, a record that stood for 29 years. The Suns defeated the Seattle Supersonics to become the Western Conference Champions but ultimately fell to Michael Jordan and the Chicago Bulls in a hardfought six-game NBA Finals series. This marked the second time the franchise made it to the Finals after its first appearance in 1976. The Suns wore the rising sunburst jerseys through 2000, never missing the playoffs in the eight-year run the uniforms were in the rotation.

The contemporary design pays tribute to the classic style with the purple base, the beloved rising sunburst logo, and





the white "SUNS" wordmark across the chest in the same 90s-inspired font. The asymmetrical short design is lined with orange trim and features the "PHOENIX" wordmark diagonally on the leg.

The Suns are wearing the uniform 17 times throughout the 2022-23 season and have celebrated the 30th anniversary by hosting corresponding 90's Nights, a dedicated 12-game theme night series to honor the iconic 1992-93 squad. During 90's Nights, fans enjoy a walk down memory lane with a complete 90's takeover from music, in-game promotions, giveaways, Suns alumni appearances and more.

The team debuted the new uniforms and hosted their first 90's Night on October 25 against the Golden State Warriors with 90's arcade games, a fan photo wall in the Pavilion and halftime performances by CL Smooth and DJ Hercules. Three-time NBA All-Star and Phoenix Suns legend Kevin Johnson was also in attendance.

On January 21 when the team takes on the Indiana Pacers, the Suns will host a special 1993 Western Conference Champions Reunion Night, with most of the members of the 1992-93 team in attendance.

Throughout the season, the Suns have held various meetand-greets with alumni. The long lines to meet these Valley greats are a testament to how much the 1992-93 squad means to the Suns community.



BACK IN BLACK

Phoenix is the home of the Suns, but fandom has grown well beyond the city's metro limits.


The team's "Valley" City Edition uniform became an instant classic after it debuted in 2020 as much for its beautiful design as for its galvanizing nature around the concept that the Valley is more than a point on the map. That uniform had an unprecedented two-year run – "unprecedented" because by Nike and NBA guidelines, City Edition uniforms are only to be worn for one season.



Building on the Valley motif rather than abandoning it for a completely new design, the Suns brought back the distinctive sunrise/sunset gradient on a black chassis with the new Nike Statement Edition uniform for the 2022-23 NBA season.

The threads debuted in a new brand video anchored with the voice of 2022 NBA Coach of the Year Monty Williams. The words of Williams double down on the organization's unwavering pursuit of excellence from sunrise to sunset. It's the devotion to the work that has put Phoenix basketball back on the global stage and what resonates with Suns fans when they hear, "We are the Valley."








The Statement Edition uniform and corresponding film capture Phoenix's vibrant colors, cityscape and community. For the first time since the 2018-19 season, the jersey features a bold "PHX" across the chest.

"Phoenix is a basketball town and we wanted to represent its spirit in this design," said Chris Grasha, creative director, Phoenix Suns. "Knowing that The Valley uniform was going to be retired, we found it important to incorporate its iconic gradient into the new Statement Edition. It has been electric seeing the players wear these on the court this season."

The gradient design continues on the short's trim and the outline of SUNS is in bold lettering along the length of each side.

The Suns debuted the Statement uniform when they tipped off the season with a win against the Dallas Mavericks at Footprint Center on October 19. The uniform will remain in the rotation for multiple seasons and replace the orange Statement uniform first introduced in 2019.

PHOENIX SUNS HONOR ARIZONA'S INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES

In November, the Phoenix Suns released their 2022-23 Nike NBA City Edition uniform honoring Arizona's 22 federally recognized indigenous tribes with its symbolic turquoise color and thoughtful design details. Arizona is home to one of the largest urban Native American populations of any U.S. state and tribal lands and reservations account for more than a quarter of the state's total land area. The City Edition uniform pays tribute to the rich histories and cultures of the state's Tribal Nations and celebrates their shared love of basketball.

"It was important to us that we have a City Edition uniform that honors the original residents of Arizona who built the state that we call home. The Suns and the Tribal Nations share a respect for family, community, the environment and basketball," said Graham Wincott, senior marketing director, Phoenix Suns.

Suns Senior Director of Live Presentation Shawn Martinez played an integral role in bringing the new uniform to life. Martinez is Diné (Navajo) and was born and raised on the Navajo reservation in northeastern Arizona where basketball was, and still is today, an important part of the community.

"Back home rezball is central to our way of life and brings

our diverse communities and cultures together on and off the court," said Martinez.

The research and design process for the City Edition uniform began two and half years ago led by the Suns' in-house marketing and creative teams with consultation from a Navajo designer.

The Suns worked directly with the Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona, comprised of leaders from 21 of the 22 Tribal Nations of Arizona, and the Navajo Nation to ensure the leaders of each sovereign nation were included in the development process. The Suns also collaborated with local groups including the Heard Museum, Phoenix Indian Center and Cahokia SocialTech and ArtSpace, an indigenous-led platform for creative placekeeping in downtown Phoenix, for educational and creative support.


"From the beginning, it was essential for us to engage and involve our tribal communities and leadership in the design and development of the uniform. This enabled us to modify and enhance the uniform design with appropriate and culturally relevant details that otherwise would have been missed. Hearing the voice of our Tribes and having their support makes this even more special. It was definitely a collective team effort," said Martinez.

With help from local partners, the team was inspired by thousands of years of shared characteristics, symbols and traits when designing the uniform. The turquoise color represents the living or protection stone, stemming from the shared belief that the earth is living and all things are precious. A color of strength, the turquoise uniforms will serve as the team's suit of armor.

A new logo inspired by the Native American medicine wheel, depicted on the waistband of the shorts, represents the four cycles of life and the four cardinal directions. The 22 feathers in the medicine wheel logo and the 22 arrowheads lining the bottom of the shorts represent each of the state's tribes.


The black tape running down the jersey top and shorts features the word for 'sun' in each of the tribes' unique native languages and is perhaps the uniform's most important feature.

The team is wearing the uniform ten times at home as part of "ORIGINATIV," a season-long celebration series hosted by Gila River Resorts and Casinos. The program name and logo, created in collaboration with Indige Design Collab



within Cahokia SocialTech and ArtSpace, were inspired by the mashup of words in Native American slang and combines the words "original" and "Native." Indige Design Collab designers Jeremy Arviso, Paul Molina and Eunique Yazzie led the project design work.

The team debuted the new uniforms on November 16 against the Golden State Warriors and invited leaders from all 22 Tribal Nations to the game for a special halftime




ceremony. Tribal leaders were presented with custom bomber jackets with the new medicine wheel logo.

Each ORIGINATIV game night features meaningful and authentic programming including a Native American victory song performed on traditional drum prior to each game, national anthems performed in Diné, Apache and O'odham languages and dance performances from the various Tribal Nations of Arizona. These activations are accompanied by educational components to ensure the performances have meaning and elevate the tribes' stories.

"This is unprecedented, this is historic to have a major sports franchise like the Phoenix Suns recognize us, the first peoples, the Indigenous peoples here in Arizona. The Suns are going to be Native America's team and to have it proudly shown and displayed on our Phoenix Suns is really a dream come true," said Governor Lewis of Gila River Indian Community.

PHOENIX SUNS AND FOOTPRINT WIN NBA CHANGEMAKER OF THE YEAR AWARD

In the summer of 2021, the Suns announced a longterm partnership with Footprint, a Gilbert, Arizona-based materials science company creating a healthier planet by reducing dependency on single- and short-term use plastics. The partnership included naming rights and product integration and is exponentially amplifying awareness and use of plant-based fiber alternatives to plastic. As part of this partnership, Footprint Center is serving as a living innovation lab to test Footprint's plant-based technologies and product lines. Fans coming to Suns or Mercury games and concerts have begun to experience food served in Footprint's biodegradable, compostable and recyclable solutions, including plates and utensils.

The Suns were recognized for this groundbreaking sustainability-focused partnership with the NBA's Changemaker of the Year award at the conclusion of the 2021-2022 season. The Changemaker of the Year award recognizes the best new partnership with an emphasis on an innovative approach in an emerging category, with the winners chosen by NBA league executives and a committee comprised of team representatives from all 30 teams. This was the second time the Suns have received this award, following their win with PayPal in 2018-2019, when the award first debuted.

"Partnering with Footprint has enhanced the Suns' efforts in so many ways. It's giving us focus and allowing us to evangelize our commitment to sustainability beyond just our goals and Footprint's goals," said Dan Costello, executive vice president and chief revenue officer of the Phoenix Suns. "We're honored to be recognized with the league's Changemaker of the Year award and look forward to growing this partnership's impact on the community and the planet by bringing other businesses and fans on this journey to reducing single-use plastic."

This partnership continues the momentum of the arena transformation that began in 2020 and has included more than 8,200 tons of material being diverted from a landfill, 757 tons of plastic and metal recycled, new LED lighting in all finished spaces, energy-efficient mechanical systems with economizers for more fresh air, and recycled materials used throughout the arena. Prior to the renovation, the arena transitioned to solar through partner APS in 2012; making it one of the first venues to take this step.

DEVIN BOOKER AND PHOENIX SUNS CHARITIES ANNOUNCE THE 2022 DEVIN BOOKER STARTING FIVE GRANTS

Booker surprised five nonprofits with \$100,000 each for the fourth consecutive year; continuing his \$2.5M pledge to support the local community

Devin Booker has been turning heads with his on-court contributions this season, but it's his off-court impact that is more meaningful to the All-NBA guard and to the community he represents.

On December 9, 2022, against the Boston Celtics, Booker and Phoenix Suns Charities announced the 2022 Devin Booker Starting Five recipients, awarding five local nonprofit organizations with \$100,000 grants each. This marked the fourth consecutive year of the initiative, continuing Booker's pledge announced in 2019 to donate \$2.5 million to Phoenix Suns Charities to improve the lives of youth and families in need throughout Arizona.

The five nonprofit organizations – Back to School Clothing Drive, Homeward Bound, Positive Coaching Alliance Arizona, Ronald McDonald House Charities of Central and Northern Arizona and The Be Kind People Project – were invited to Footprint Center for the game, unaware of the surprise that awaited them. During a first half timeout, representatives from each organization were brought on court for a contest where they were surprised with an announcement that they had been chosen as this season's Devin Booker Starting Five grant recipients.

"It's one of the most exciting things that I'm a part of, I'd say mostly because we're 20 organizations in now, all non-profits here in Arizona," said Booker following the game. "We're still trying to find creative ways to surprise the people, and to do it here on our home court in front of everybody is a special moment."



"This is year four now and it's something that's here to stay. I want to thank everybody on the Phoenix Suns Charities board, including Sarah [Krahenbuhl] running it, and my brother is on the board and they're really passionate about these projects. They do a good job of selecting the organizations that we use. We're just trying to level the playing field for everybody and give everybody an equal chance out here. We've been doing a great job of that and it's something that we want to keep doing."

The fourth year of the Devin Booker Starting Five is the latest iteration of Booker's commitment to the Valley. For the past several years, in partnership with Phoenix Suns Charities, Booker has treated youth from around the Valley to holiday shopping sprees, pledged more than \$100,000 in 2020 amidst the COVID-19 pandemic and is a Special Olympics Global Ambassador promoting inclusion through sport, especially opportunities involving basketball.

"Devin's contributions to the community transcend the basketball court," said Sarah Krahenbuhl, Phoenix Suns Charities Executive Director and Vice President, Social Responsibility, Phoenix Suns. "The Devin Booker Starting Five program has positively impacted thousands of children and families across Arizona and paved the way for a brighter future for those in need. Since arriving in the Valley, giving back to this community has been a focal point for Devin and his entire family, including his brother Davon who serves on the board of directors of Phoenix Suns Charities. We could not be more grateful for Devin and his family's generosity."




Cam Payne's 15 Families of Christmas



Cam Payne Makes \$10,000 Donation to Le Bonheur Children's Hospital in Memphis



A REGULAR SEASON TO REMEMBER

The Suns' 2021-2022 regular season was historic. Here are a few of the records, firsts and other notes that put into context what a special regular season it was.

FRANCHISE RECORD 64 WINS

The Suns won a franchise record 64 games, surpassing the previous mark of 62 held by the 1992-93 and 2004-05 squads. The 2021-22 Suns are only the 25th team in the 75year history of the NBA to win at least 64 games in a season.

BEST RECORD IN THE LEAGUE ... BY 8 GAMES

The Suns' 64-18 mark earned the team the number one overall seed throughout the postseason as the league's best record. This is the third time in franchise history that the Suns have finished with the NBA's best record, also doing so in 1992-93 and 2004-05.

The Suns not only finished with the league's best record but also eight games above the NBA's second-best record (Memphis at 56-26). The 2021-22 Suns are the first team in 22 years and just the fifth team since the NBA-ABA merger to finish at least eight games up over the league's secondbest record. The list since the merger: 2021-22 Phoenix Suns (8-game lead for league's best record), 1999-00 Los Angeles Lakers (8), 1995-96 Chicago Bulls (8), 1991-92 Chicago Bulls (10), 1983-84 Boston Celtics (8).

FIRST TEAM EVER TO INCREASE WIN TOTAL BY AT LEAST 13 IN THREE STRAIGHT SEASONS

In 2018-19, the Suns won 19 games. The team jumped to 34 wins in 2019-20 then 51 wins in 2020-21. By winning 64 games in 2021-22, the Suns are the first team in NBA history to increase its win total by at least 13 wins in each of three consecutive seasons. In fact, prior to this season, only one team had ever increased its total by as many as 10+ wins in each of three straight seasons (Boston from 1970-1973).

FRANCHISE RECORD 32 ROAD WINS

In addition to a franchise record for overall wins, the Suns set a franchise record with 32 road wins this season, surpassing the previous mark of 31 road wins set by the 2004-05 team. By going 32-9, the Suns' .780 road winning percentage tied for the fifth-best road record in NBA history, trailing only the 2015-16 Golden State Warriors (34-7), 1971-72 Los Angeles Lakers (31-7), 1995-96 Chicago Bulls (33-8) and 1972-73 Boston Celtics (32-8), and tied with the 1996-97 Miami Heat and 1974-75 Boston Celtics.



BETTER ROAD RECORD THAN ANY OTHER TEAM'S HOME RECORD

The Suns' 32-9 road record was better than any other team in the league's home record. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Suns are just the second team in NBA history to finish with a better road record than any other team's home record along with the 1969-70 New York Knicks.

FRANCHISE RECORD 18-GAME WINNING STREAK

The Suns opened the season 1-3, before going on an 18game winning streak from Oct. 30 – Dec. 2, the longest streak in franchise history (surpassing the previous record of 17 straight wins from Dec. 29, 2006 – Jan. 28, 2007). The 18-game streak marked just the 17th winning streak of at least 18 games in NBA history.

Within the 18-game winning streak, the Suns completed 'no-loss November' by going a perfect 16-0 in the month. It marked both the most wins in a month and the most wins without a loss in a month in franchise history, and ties as the second-most wins in a month without a loss in NBA history, trailing only the Atlanta Hawks' 17-0 record in January of 2015.

The Suns had four separate winning streaks of at least eight games this season, winning 18 straight from Oct. 30 – Dec. 2, 11 straight from Jan. 11 – Feb. 1, eight straight from Feb. 5 – 24 and nine straight from March 13 – 30. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Suns are just the eighth team in NBA history to have four winning streaks of at least eight games in the same season and the first team to do so since the 2007-08 Boston Celtics.

TWO UNBEATEN MONTHS ON THE ROAD

The Suns finished a perfect 8-0 in road games for both the months of November and January this season. Per the Elias Sports Bureau, the Suns are the first team in NBA history with multiple unbeaten months (min. eight games) on the road in the same season.

UNDEFEATED WHEN LEADING AFTER THREE QUARTERS

The Suns went a perfect 47-0 when holding a lead after three quarters this season. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the 47-0 record when leading after three quarters is an NBA record for most wins in a season without a loss when entering the fourth quarter with the lead (previously 43-0 by the 2019-20 Los Angeles Lakers).

In addition, the Suns were .500 (17-17) in games when trailing after three quarters.

TOP 5 IN OFFENSIVE RATING AND DEFENSIVE RATING


"If you can be a top-five offensive and defensive efficiency team, you got a chance to win big," Monty Williams said on March 13 and has expressed a similar sentiment throughout his time as Suns head coach. The Suns achieved that goal in 2021-22, finishing fifth in Offensive Rating (114.2) and third in Defensive Rating (106.8) to post the league's best Net Rating (+7.5). This marked the first time the Suns have recorded the NBA's best Net Rating as far back as the NBA Advanced Stats database goes (since 1996-97).

33-9 IN CLUTCH GAMES

The Suns posted a league-best 33-9 record in games to reach clutch time (defined as a game within five points in the final 5:00). The Suns outscored their opponents 379-272 in 130 minutes of clutch time this season, shooting 57.8% from the field and 43.1% from three-point range.

LEAGUE-LEADING FG%

The Suns led the NBA by shooting 48.5% from the field, the franchise's first time leading the league in field goal percentage since 2009-10.







By holding the Western Conference's best record through games played on Feb. 6, the Suns earned the opportunity for Monty Williams and the rest of the Suns' coaching staff to coach Team LeBron at the 2022 NBA All-Star Game in Cleveland. It marked the fifth time in franchise history that the Suns coaching staff worked the NBA All-Star Game with 2022 joining 1981, 1993, 1995 and 2007.


The Suns scored at least 125 points in seven consecutive games spanning March 13 – 24, setting a Suns franchise record by surpassing the previous record of five straight in 1992.
